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Say "YES" to Jewish Education

In 2018, the Jewish Council set a goal for itself to create a mechanism to provide scholarship funds for local area youth to participate in Jewish experiential education opportunities. After several committee meetings and board discussions, the Youth Experience Scholarship Fund was established and the first award was given in 2019. The YES fund and its process for selection and distribution was developed by the JCNCF Grants committee, which oversees our monthly Chai grants program.

The Youth Experience Scholarships provides funding for Jewish individuals between the ages of 10 to 21 who reside in North Central Florida to attend qualified not-for-profit Jewish Youth Experience programs. Some of the criteria used in selecting scholarship recipients would include: demonstrated interest, achievement, and leadership in Jewish education (Religious School, Bar/Bat/B'nai Mitzvah, Jewish Youth Groups, Mitzvah Projects, etc.), reason(s) for attending the Youth Experience Program selected, involvement in community service organizations and/or projects and financial need. Additionally, recipients will be required to do follow up work after their experiences. Suggestions include volunteering at PJ Library programs, Mitzvah Day or Yom Ha Atzmaut or speaking about their experiences to community groups.





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The Beit Ruth Village Celebrates Its Bat Mitzvah Year

It is hard to believe that December marked the last month of celebrating the Bat Mitzvah year of the Beit Ruth Educational & Therapeutic Village for at-risk girls in Israel. What an incredible milestone – 13 years of bringing in and caring for girls, most of whom arrived with just the clothes on their backs and, if they were lucky, a toothbrush in their hands.

Hundreds of girls, as young as 13 – frightened and suffering from trauma – were welcomed into the compassionate arms of our staff who provide lifesaving interventions.

We can all be inspired by our girls' perseverance and by their tenacity to take what life has given them – through no fault of their own – and to not just overcome, but to succeed. It is just remarkable.

We look forward to visiting you on January 12 and are grateful to be part of JCNCF's "Celebration for Education!"

At Beit Ruth, education comes in many forms. As a cornerstone of our holistic framework, we provide a rich curriculum of academic subjects. We are proud of our girls who, last year, scored an average of 85 points on their matriculation exams – above the national average!

We are also aware of the importance of English-as-a-Second Language to improve our girls' abilities to achieve economic independence and to participate in Israel's global economy. It is with thanks to the Jonathan M. Tisch College of Civic Life at Tufts University in Massachusetts that we now have the "Tufts International Fellowship Program." Our first cadre of Summer Fellows arrived in June with primary responsibilities to teach English during the summer school session.

One Fellow shared, "As summer school progressed, I saw girls overcome their insecurity of speaking in a new language – a step that allowed them to vastly improve the flow and content of their speech. One girl who hadn't spoken any English with me the entire summer asked me in English if I could pass her a Bamba snack! This simple question was one of many crowning achievements of the summer."

We are also so proud and grateful to share that since our last visit with you, we have broken ground on a fourth residential house! This will increase our capacity to serve 60 girls at a time. And we are working on raising the funds to build a fifth house.

Within these houses, Beit Ruth girls are being taught dignity because they are treated with dignity. Every decision made at Beit Ruth – from buying new clothes for special occasions, or giving girls the freedom to decorate their rooms – is made with the purpose of treating them with dignity. Every girl receives kindness, love, gentleness, and, yes, firmness, because we all need that too. But no one ever feels less than here because no one

At Beit Ruth girls don't just wake up each morning – they RISE up – every – single – day. They show up with their courage, their strength, their resilience, and their desire to accomplish so much more in their future than their past would have them believe they could do. How do we know this? Because our girls tell us:

"At Beit Ruth, I was cared for by women who wanted to see me succeed, grow, and flourish, and who saw my potential. And more importantly, they wanted me to see it too. From the fist moment – and for the first time – I felt empowered and saw a future for myself that I could be proud of." Hannah, 17 years old

"Beit Ruth completely changed my life. I am grateful and proud of my accomplishments, but what I am most thankful for is breaking the cycle of generational abuse so my three daughters will never have to know a life of fear, of harm, a life on the streets, and a life that is not worth living." Miri, 23 years old

"At Beit Ruth, I found myself not only studying, but wanting to study. After 3 years of not really doing anything at school and believing that I would never accomplish anything, I chose to stay another year to finish my matriculation."

Hannah, Miri, and Irit went from being teenage girls living on the streets, in abusive homes, and in unsuccessful placements to the caring and family-like environment of Beit Ruth. There is no better way to describe it than through our Jewish teaching: "Whoever saves one life, saves the world entire."

We look forward to joining you in January and to sharing more about the Village. We thank you so very much for your continued and critical support of our girls. Wishing all of you a happy, healthy, and prosperous New Year! Thank you for helping to save a world entire.

Jaffa Institute Grows to Serve Tel Aviv's Vulnerable

Just a few miles south of the affluent North Tel Aviv lies Jaffa, where 50% of residents live in poverty. Together, JCNCF and the Jaffa Institute are creating brighter futures in this community.

Established in 1982, the Jaffa Institute is a private nonprofit organization that assists more than 4,000 disadvantaged children and their families to escape poverty annually. We do this through 40 programs, including after-school centers, residential facilities, food initiatives, women's empowerment, and support for Holocaust survivors, immigrants, and others throughout Israel.

At our flagship After-School Educational Enrichment Centers, atrisk children receive hot meals followed by academic and therapeutic support (Photo right). Based on our belief that the children



of Jaffa deserve the same opportunities as those in North Tel Aviv or Gainesville, our programming includes music, art, cycling, tennis, soccer, and equestrian. This year, we began to offer surfing. Although everyone fell off their board at some point, the staff encouraged them to get back up, transcend their challenges, and ride the wave.

Congruent with our commitment to equal opportunities, the Jaffa Institute launched the innovative Science Mobile Program last year (Photo below). Operating inside of an RV trailer equipped with cutting-edge technologies, such as 3D printers, the Science Mobile travels to our program sites offering hands-on STEM education. Based on the project's success, we are now building two more Science Mobiles, which will allow us to serve additional children at our Centers and at under-served local public schools.



Ensuring a continuum of support, our Jump Start Program tutors adolescents, resulting in an average increase of 12% in English, 13% in Hebrew, and 16% in math amongst participants last year. When Emile joined the program, he struggled due to his learning disabilities, but he never missed a session with his tutor, Nikki. Thanks to his hard work and Nikki's support, Emile passed all of his finals last June. This year, Nikki is continuing to assist Emile as he transitions from a special education classroom into a mainstream learning environment.

Over at our residential Bet Shemesh Educational Center, the cinema class won a national film award, 11 boys of Ethiopian descent celebrated their Bar Mitzvah, and the seniors graduating from our mainstream track earned the highest matriculation rate of any BSEC class yet ¬— 92%!

As a part of the Jaffa Institute's holistic approach to community develop-

ment, our Welfare to Wellbeing: Comprehensive Vocational Training Program for Disadvantaged Women assists long-term unemployed women — primarily single mothers — to find jobs. As a result of the program's intensive structure, 83% of the women who graduated this year are now employed.

One graduate, Tami, re-entered the workplace after 18 years of unemployment! She shared the program's impact on her in her own words: "I learned to talk in a positive way. I also came to understand that I have a responsibility as a mother, which is in and of itself an important role, but working also allows you to profit – and not just monetarily." Strong Families, Strong Israel

In 2019, the Jaffa Institute expanded our Parent-Child Center, which serves disadvantaged families with children ages six and under. In addition to opening a new program site in a low-income neighborhood of South Tel Aviv, our original Jaffa Center also launched a special workshop, "Adjustment to Fatherhood."

In a recent session, one participant shared his transformational fatherhood moment:

"The first time I felt like a real father was last week when I was washing the dishes. While the water was running and I was putting away the plates, my son crawled over and tugged on my pant leg. I looked down and my son was looking directly in my eyes with his arms raised up high, asking me to pick him up. He wasn't asking for food or toys, but for affection, from me. In that moment, I was the proudest father in the world."

As we near the end of the year, we at the Jaffa Institute want to thank JCNCF for your steadfast support over the last 20 years.

Your generosity is helping to provide disadvantaged children and their families with the holistic support they need to become contributing members of the State of Israel.

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JCNCF Honors Sharon and Andy Hirshik



Jewish Education was Sharon Hirshik's passion for 20 years. She first taught Religious School at Congregation B'nai Israel in Boca Raton. Following her work at the Religious School, she taught early childhood education at the Donna Klein Jewish Academy, where she then became Director of the Lower School. DKJA was an agency of the South Palm Beach Jewish Federation. When Sharon and Andy moved to Westchester County, New York, she became the Director of the Nursery School at Temple Israel Center in White Plains until she retired in 2005. Watching children gain a strong sense of their Jewish identity was her greatest thrill.

Sharon became a JCNCF Board Member in 2007. She has served as JCNCF president and vice president and has chaired the JCNCF Grants Committee for most of her tenure on the board. The grants committee is an important vehicle to offer enrichment to children in the community. PJ Library began as one of those programs selected by the committee. The newly offered Youth Experience Scholarships also fall under the auspices of the grants committee. Sharon is proud of the good work done by the committee.

Andy Hirshik spent almost 40 years working in Information Management in various locations in the US and Europe, the last 30 with IBM. After retiring

to Gainesville, he became active in the Jewish community, serving on the board and various committees of Temple Shir Shalom for over 10 years, including 2 years as board president.

While being part of an organization is rewarding, Andy wanted a more direct "hands on" experience serving the larger Gainesville community. Over the past dozen years, he has been mentoring students as part of the Take Stock in Children program. Working with "at risk" students from middle through high school, mentors help them qualify for and select a scholarship supported college education. While challenging, Andy has found it to be a rewarding experience. Check it out, there is always a great need for mentors just like you.

JCNCF Honors Ken Wald and Robin West

Ken Wald is Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Political Science and the Samuel R. Shorstein Professor Emeritus of American Jewish Culture and Society at the University of Florida. During his UF tenure, Wald served as director of the Center for Jewish Studies and co-founded the Summer Holocaust Institute for Florida's Teachers. He also served on the Florida Commissioner of Education's Taskforce on Holocaust Education. At UF, Wald developed and taught courses on Judaism and politics and Israeli politics and supervised numerous senior theses on those topics. Since retiring, he has continued his research. This includes a new book, Foundations of American Jewish Liberalism, published in 2019 by Cambridge University Press. Wald has been a visiting professor at Harvard University, University of Michigan, Hebrew University of Jeru-

salem, Haifa University, University of Toronto, Linnaeus University (Sweden), and the University of Manchester (England). In 2011, he was named the Teacher-Scholar of the Year, the highest faculty award given by the University of Florida.

Robin West, Emeritus Professor of Psychology at the University of Florida (UF), completed her Ph.D. at Vanderbilt and postdoctoral work at the Aging and Development Program at Washington University. She served as Director of the UF Center for Gerontological Studies, Associate Director of the Institute on Aging at UF, and on the B'nai Israel Education Committee. In 30 years of college teaching, Dr. West authored over 70 academic papers, and two popular memory books -- Everyday Memory Clinic Workbook and Memory Fitness Over 40 (published in four countries) -- and developed the Memory Matters curriculum for the National Council on Aging. Other national recognition includes a Fulbright Fellowship to Israel, a MindAlert award from the American Society on Aging for her Everyday Memory Clinic training program, undergraduate and graduate mentoring awards, a Brookdale Foundation Re-



search Fellowship, and the prestigious Lawton Distinguished Contribution Award for Applied Gerontology from the American Psychological Association. The Lawton award was given in recognition of "contributions that have improved the quality of life of older persons." These contributions include research and extensive community involvement in training workshops and public speeches for lay audiences on the topic of memory and how to improve memory at any age.

The University of Florida Center for European Studies is collaborating with the Gainesville Fine Arts Association to bring *Pictures of Resistance* to Gainesville. *Pictures of Resistance* is traveling exhibit of the photographs by Faye Schulman, the only known Jewish partisan to document the World War II experience on film.

The lives of partisans depended on their ability to remain unseen, undocumented and unidentifiable. But one fighter, Faye Schulman, had a camera. Schulman's rare collection of images captures the camaraderie, horror and loss, bravery and triumph of the rag-tag, tough partisans—some Jewish, some not—who fought the Germans and their collaborators.

This traveling exhibition sponsored by the Jewish Partisan Educational Foundation (JPEF) poses probing questions about the life Faye Shulman. Why did she become a war documentarian at great risk to her life? How did she get photographic supplies, much less develop the film? How did she manage to survive as one of the few Jewish women among the Partisans?

This rare collection is accompanied by a detailed story behind each photograph, written in a first person by Faye Schulman.

The exhibition is curated by Jill Vexler, Ph.D. who has extensive experience with Holocaust-related exhibitions, including Letters to Sala: A Young Woman's Life in Nazi Labor Camps, Remembering Luboml: Images of a Jewish Community, and Oswiecim, Ospitzin, Auschwitz: Portrait of Memories, the permanent exhibition at the Auschwitz Jewish Center in Oswiecim, Poland. Additional sponsors for this exhibit are: the Alexander Grass Chair in Jewish Studies and the Jewish Council of North Central Florida

The Exhibition runs from January 14th through March 14th and will be displayed at the GFAA Gallery at 1314 South Main Street. Gallery hours are Tuesday – Saturday 11am – 5pm. More information can be found at gaines-villefinearts.org.

Rabbi Joseph of Temple Shir Shalom has announced a series of adult education classes in January and February 2019 on the theme of communal responsibility, and specifically this: what is our responsibility to our community for injustice and shortcomings which we did not ourselves commit?
