JCNCF Annual Campaign to Focus on the JDC


The Jewish Council's Annual Campaign is the foundation of everything we do and your gift to the Annual Campaign is how we support Jewish causes internationally and funds our community-wide programming here in North Central Florida. This issue of The Chronicle features our Annual Campaign Roll of Honor, where we acknowledge with gratitude all those donors who contributed and helped us make our goal of raising \$180,000 in the last campaign. In particular, we are very proud to have donated over \$40,000 collectively to our charitable partners at The Beit Ruth Educational & Therapeutic Village and The Jaffa Institute. Both of these agencies provide critical social services to Israel's most

vulnerable populations and we are honored to be their partner in this important work.

The focus of the 5779 Annual Campaign (2018/19) will shift to the work of the Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC). The Jewish Council has pledged to donate \$70,000 to the JDC by December 31, 2019 and thanks to a gift from an anonymous donor,

those funds will be matched at 50% turning our allocation into \$105,000.

Saving Jewish Lives and Building Jewish Life



On Thursday, October 11, the Jewish Council of North Central Florida will host Dr. William Recant of the Jewish Joint Distribution Committee for a talk at Temple Shir Shalom.

Dr. Will Recant serves as the senior staff person regarding all of JDC's non-sectarian programs and directs JDC's Government Affairs program. He is one of America's top experts in the field of international relations, disaster relief and development.

This talk is free and open to the community.

With more than three decades of work in global development and crisis management, Recant has successfully directed relief efforts and disaster assistance programs for the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC) in Japan, Haiti, Kosovo, Rwanda, Ethiopia, Cuba and countries affected by the Indian Ocean Tsunami.

A highly sought-after source on crisis response, Dr. Recant has appeared in a variety of TV, print, and radio outlets discussing

the rescue and relief of distressed populations, international disaster response and preparedness, and global volunteerism.

He has advised and briefed U.S. Presidents, government agencies, members of Congress, local, national, international government officials, embassy staff, as well as community leaders and academics.

Previously Dr. Recant was the Executive Director of the American Association for Ethiopian Jews, where he served as the chief advocate of the Ethiopian Jewry movement and was responsible for helping to implement one of the largest resettlement operations in the 20th century with the airlift of Ethiopian Jews to Israel.

Recant holds both a Master's Degree and Ph.D in Political Science from George Washington University.

Iranian General Accuses Israel of Stealing Iranian Clouds

Israel Develops System to Confuse Enemy Military Drones

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JDC's Hesed Welfare System: Compassionate

Elderly Jews in the Former Soviet Union (FSU) are the poorest in the world. Many survived the Holocaust, and all lived for decades under a communist regime that discriminated relentlessly against them, dismantled Jewish institutions, and consigned them to poverty. Today, elderly Jews live on pensions as low as \$2 per day, forcing them to choose among the necessities of life.

After a lifetime of suffering, oppression, and political strife, these Jews are engaged in a daily struggle to survive in their final years. The promise of an old-age pension that would sustain them after retirement has amounted to a pittance that does not begin to cover their basic needs. Each day, they face the same question: without having enough money to pay for food, medicine, and heating fuel, what will they be forced to

forgo? Often, when confronted with this brutal choice, our clients prioritize the meager amount of food and medicine they can afford over fuel. Thus, in freezing temperatures, vulnerable elderly are shivering indoors without heat.

Loneliness and isolation add to the burden faced by these aging Jews. Many have outlived their spouses; others have family members who are overwhelmed by their own financial or health challenges or have moved away to pursue economic opportunities. Without support such as visits by JDC's homecare workers—in many cases an elderly person's only human contact—these elderly would be totally cut off from the Jewish community and the world.

The reasons for the dire situation are multiple and complex. In terms of JDC's response, two things are straightforward: one, our care has life-changing impact, and two, there is no one else offering this vital aid. This is why providing care to impoverished elderly Jews in the FSU is our top fundraising priority in 2018.

JDC's Hesed Welfare System (Hesed) provides needy Jewish elderly with support and assistance that helps them meet their basic needs, and live in safety and with dignity. Hesed operates in 11 former Soviet countries, with Hesed Centers serving as the direct point of contact. The network includes both large and small centers, many of which run additional branches or maintain at least one employee in smaller towns and cities, where they serve vulnerable elderly living in outlying, isolated locations. Hesed provides the following services:

Homecare: Prioritized for the most frail and isolated individuals. Homecare workers assist with personal care and household tasks for those unable to perform them on their own, and at the same time, provide priceless social interaction and a link to the outside world.

Hunger Relief: Bank and food cards are a cost-effective means of providing support while maintaining client dignity and independence. Bankcards enable clients to purchase food or medical supplies at participating businesses. Hot communal meals are provided for those able to leave their homes and enjoy the company of their peers, while food packages and meals-on-wheels are delivered to those less mobile.

Medical Support: Many of JDC's clients suffer from medical conditions requiring expensive medications, operations, and equipment they cannot afford on their own. Rather than force clients to choose between covering food or medical needs, JDC helps these individuals pay for necessary medicines and offers medical consultations with volunteer doctors.

Winter Relief: Winters in the FSU are harsh and many of our clients live in poorly insulated homes with insufficient or costly heating. JDC provides seasonal assistance with utility bills, and arranges for extra blankets, winter clothing, and help to seal and insulate windows.

Minor Home and Appliance Repairs: JDC arranges for free home repairs and repairs of household appliances, to help keep homes warmer, safer, and more functional.

SOS Emergency Assistance: JDC's provides one-time emergency grants to clients who suddenly require major surgery or essential, but expensive medicines, appliance repairs or other urgent, unexpected expenses.

Social Programs: Day centers, warm homes and other social and community activities combat feelings of loneliness and isolation by stimulating intellectual and emotional health, which can be of vital importance to our clients' general sense of well-being.

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Care for the World's Neediest Elderly Jews

Tsilla's Story.....

Tsilla Gorshkova wakes up every winter morning before dawn—she's learned that 6 a.m. is the best time to load her kitchen furnace with firewood so her small wooden cabin stays warm in frigid Siberian temperatures.

A former kindergarten teacher, the 82-yearold is one of two Jewish residents of Socialnaya village, a tiny hamlet in the Russian Far East tucked between Khabarovsk and Birobidzhan, the capital of the Jewish Autonomous Region, an area where Jews in the Soviet Union were told they would be sent to build a "Jewish homeland" that never came to be.

Living on just a few dollars a day, Gorshkova would likely go hungry without the food packages and holiday supplies she receives from JDC and the global Jewish community.

She's come to count on the flour, canned fish, sugar, and other supplies JDC provides: "They're Jewish, and that's why they help me—because I'm Jewish, too," she said. "Thank you for helping us, for not forgetting us."

Gorshkova is one of some 100,000 elderly Jews helped by the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC) across the former Soviet Union (FSU). Her care is coordinated by the Birobidzhan branch of the Khabarovsk Hesed social welfare center.

For more than 100 years, JDC has been saving Jewish lives, building Jewish life, and transforming Jewish values into action that benefits all people in need. As the world's leading Jewish humanitarian aid group, JDC today works in some 70 countries and in Israel to alleviate hunger and hardship, rescue Jews in danger, create lasting connections to Jewish life, and provide disaster relief and development support for victims of natural and man-made disasters.

Elderly Jews in the FSU are the poorest in the world. Many are Holocaust survivors, and all lived for decades under a Communist regime that discriminated relentlessly against Jews, consigned them to poverty, and dismantled Jewish institutions.

Albina Sergeeva, the Birobidzhan Hesed branch's coordinator, manages JDC's welfare response in the five districts surrounding the city: food cards for the supermarket, heating help during the region's harsh weather, warm winter clothing and boots, free or discounted medicines and dentures, and much more.

"The help is really multi-faceted, and for these Jews, very important," she said. "For the needlest Jews, there's really nowhere else to turn besides JDC."

Sergeeva said she can't imagine what life would be like for elderly Jews without the assistance they receive from the global Jewish community.

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UF Psychiatrist to Speak on Student Mental Health

As a Jewish mother of a twenty-two and twenty-five-year-old, I have witnessed first-hand the academic stress and social pressures that college students face. As a psychiatrist working with college students for over twenty years, I have seen how pressures have contributed to an upsurge in mental health problems on campus: Rates of depression have increased by fifty percent and rates of anxiety disorders have doubled since 2011. As a Jewish mother, I wish a hearty hug and warm bowl of chicken soup were enough to help children face the challenges. But as a psychiatrist, I have seen that parental support needs to be far more comprehensive to deal with the problems and pressures on campus today.

What would you do if your daughter reported her anxiety was so severe she was failing exams? How would you respond if your son was not sure his life was worth living after his girlfriend broke up with him? Parents increasingly are faced with



these questions, which I answer in *The Campus Cure: A Parent's Guide to Mental Health and Wellness for College Students*. With stories and the latest scientific literature, I offer tools for parents to prevent, respond to, and treat problems like depression, anxiety, loneliness, and cultural challenges.

As parents, you can play a big role in your child's success in college. You can recognize problems early on and encourage your student to see a therapist on campus. You can link your child with campus resources if they are stuck in an academic rut that is making them feel down. Calling more often or visiting during a time of despair can help your student avert a crisis. Recognizing when your child is having a more serious problem like substance abuse or psychosis can make a big difference in their getting timely psychiatric help.

Most importantly, parents can offer perspective and hope to their children that their situation will improve. As someone growing up in the Jewish faith, as a mother, and as a psychiatrist, I have learned the lesson that hope - tikvah - is the best chicken soup for the soul.

These steps are similar to those outlined in Patanjali's eight limbs of yoga and provide us with points of connection and exploration to inform an embodied experience.

"Yoga-Nish" is an opportunity to access this state that moves us beyond our ordinary perception to a glimpse of the world beyond ordinary perception, which opens a portal for us to observe these steps daily. Both the Torah and Patanjali's Yoga state, that it is by stepping away from our everyday lives and purifying our senses, that clarity is accessed with deeper connection to the divine.


