Monday, October 28 is No Place For Hate Day

Monday, October 28 is national "No Place for Hate" Day and the Jewish Council and Congregation B'nai Israel are proud to host Lonny Wilk of the Anti-Defamation League for two important talks. Community members are invited to Congregation B'nai Israel at 6 pm for The Current State Of Anti-Semitism: Zero Hour Or Zero-Sum Game? And at 7:30, Wilk will lead Why Me? Standing Up To Anti-Semitism And All Bigotry, a workshop for families on what they can do to help children stand up to hate.

This programming has been developed, in part, as a response to Anti-Semitic bullying experienced by local children in Alachua County public schools. In April and May of this year, Jewish community members met with representatives from the Alachua County School Board to address their concerns about hateful incidents that had been reported. The School Board was very responsive to these concerns, and over the summer, developed strategies to address them. On Tuesday, October 29, the ACSB will provide 50 teachers with the opportunity to participate in a training session called *Echoes and Reflections*, which will be led by scholars from Yad Vashem in Jerusalem. The School Board has also outlined additions to the curriculum and other social/behavioral strategies for addressing these issues. These programs come just

after October 27, which is the first anniversary of the Pittsburgh shooting at the Tree of Life synagogue, where 11 people were murdered and 6 were injured.

JCNCF is Offering Youth Experience Scholarships Again This Year

The Jewish Council of North Central Florida (JCNCF) is proud to be awarding scholarships to individuals between the ages of 10 to 21 who reside in North Central Florida. Individuals are encouraged to apply for scholarships to attend qualified not-for-profit Jewish Youth Experience programs.

The program must be an out of town experience that ends by August 31, 2020. The deadline for application submissions is December 1, 2019. **Applications can be downloaded at www.jcncf.org/services.**

Some of the criteria used in selecting scholarship recipients would include: Demonstrated interest, achievement, and leadership in Jewish education (Religious School, Bar/Bat/B'nai Mitzvah, Jewish Youth Groups, Mitzvah Projects, etc.), reason(s) for attending the Youth Experience Program selected, involvement in community service organizations and/or projects, and financial need.

Recipients will be required to do one follow up activity after their experiences.





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Schonwald Correspondence Gift to Judaica Library

A small and precious gem with a long, trans-continental, and emotional history was gifted to the Price Library of Judaica at the beginning of this year. Professor Emeritus of Political Science at the University of Florida, Kenneth Wald donated a family correspondence dated 1939-1941. It contains probably the last letters sent by his grandparents, Curt and Regina Schönwald, to his father, Henry Wald. His grandparents, who were still living in Berlin, were hoping to find an escape route from the Nazi terror and to join Henry in America in his new home in Lincoln, Nebraska. After that became impossible, they considered Cuba.


Professor Kenneth Wald had no knowledge of the existence of these letters until after his father's death: he discovered them while arranging his late father's papers. He had them translated and began a quest for more information about the history of the family leading him to the town of Grossröhrsdorf where his grandparents owned and operated a department store. Curt and Regina Schönwald were forced to give up the store and their possessions at the beginning of the War and subsequently moved to Berlin. They were deported on March 28, 1942 to Trawniki camp near Lublin in Poland and afterwards could not be traced.

In Grossröhrsdorf, Professor Wald's research has also met local interest in studying the wartime history of the town. In the meantime, and on the other side of the Atlantic, Professor Wald published an essay on his grandparents and his determination to preserve their memory. This essay inspired high-school drama teacher and playwright Christopher Maly in Lincoln to write a play using the Schönwalds' letters. The play, *The Ghosts on the Wall*, found additional audiences as this April it was put on stage in Gainesville, Florida, at the Actor's Warehouse.

The donation of these letters to the Price Library opens a new chapter in their history. Arranged together with English translations in the Schön-

wald Family Correspondence, they are available for students, researchers, and general readers seeking to learn about the story of the Schönwalds as narrated in their letters, the history of the Holocaust, and the 20th-century history of Jewish immigration to the US.

An Afternoon with Holocaust Survivor Sami Steigmann Sunday, October 20 at 1 pm The Chabad Lubavitch Jewish Center of Ocala and The Villages

As a Jew from Czernowitz, Sami's life story is remarkable. He was born on December 21, 1939. From 1941 through 1944, he was with his parents in the Ukraine at Mogilev-Podolsky, a labor camp in an area called Transnistria. Subjected to Nazi medical experimentation, his life was saved by a German woman when he was dying of starvation. The camp was liberated by the Red Army and he grew up in Transylvania. In 1961, he immigrated to Israel and served in the Israeli Air Force.

Steigmann will share his story about life in a Nazi labor camp, the medical experiments he was subjected to, how he survived and the many lessons he's learned throughout his life.

Listen to his first-hand account of a dark period of recent history and be inspired by a story of resilience and the ability to overcome the greatest difficulties. This is a once in a lifetime event. This event is free, but donations are appreciated.

Actors' Warehouse Presents The Ghosts on The Wall Nov 15 - 24


The Ghosts on the Wall, a play based on the letters of Curt and Regina Schönwald, will premier at the Actors' Warehouse on Friday, November 15 and run through Thursday, November 24, 2019.

This intimate portrayal of the Schönwald family's experience during the Holocaust came to be when the author of the play, Chris Maly, read an essay discussing letters written between the Schönwalds and their son published in 2012 by Curt and Regina's grandson, Dr. Ken Wald

Chris is a high school history teacher in Dr. Wald's home town of Lincoln, Nebraska. He was inspired, not only by the Schönwald family story, but also by the experiences of his grandfather, who was a liberator in WWII. Chris had previously written a play about Emmet Till which won the prestigious Trenholm Award from the National Education Association.

The first performance of *Ghosts* in Gainesville was part of JCNCF's 2019 Holocaust Remembrance Program, which was attended by over 200 people. Thank you to the Actors' Warehouse for bringing this important and moving production to the wider Gainesville community.







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
Traditions & Changes at The Center For Jewish Studies

Good news for the Jewish community here and afar: Norman J. W. Goda, Ph.D., is now the Director of the Center for Jewish Studies (the CJS) at the University of Florida. He remains the Norman and Irma Braman Chair for Holocaust Studies and will continue his research, writing, and teaching while continuing and expanding the scope and impact of the CJS.

Dr. Goda wasn't looking for a new position, but due to his deep belief in the importance of the CJS, he accepted the opportunity. He proudly points out that UF is Florida's flagship university, and that the CJS is the most important and most developed Jewish Studies program in Florida, as well as among the best in the country. Prior to arriving at UF in 2009, Dr. Goda was chair of the Department of History at Ohio University, so he has administrative experience in addition to years of faculty work steeped in teaching, research, and writing.

Dr. Goda grew up in Washington, DC, and was bar mitzvahed in a Conservative synagogue. He obtained his BA in History and English at Rice University. He completed his MS and PhD at UNC Chapel Hill. He and his wife, Gwyneth, and their two "fine young sons" recently returned refreshed from sabbatical in France, where Dr. Goda continued his research on the 1987 trial of Klaus Barbie.

Dr. Goda already has three explicit initiatives in motion: a new faculty hire for Israel Studies; a graduate-level certificate in Holocaust Studies, related to any discipline at the MA and PhD levels; and a BA-level certificate in Israel Studies. Interestingly, the graduate certificate program will be open to non-degree-seeking students. Longer-term goals he is considering are online courses and streaming of some lectures.

"Jews need to be aware of themselves and the depth of Jewish history and culture due to the growing issue of anti-Semitism on both the right and the left. And ambivalence regarding Israel has, of course, become more vocal in recent years." Thus, CJS programs evolve in order to respond to current events and research. "And if you're not building, you're going in reverse." Unlike the majority of other departments and programs at UF, the CJS receives no funding from UF other than for salaries and relies in large part on donors, small and large, for programming and research.

The CJS has accomplished a great deal despite limited funding from UF and is very appreciative of outside gifts. Fortunately, the Center has been entrusted "by some very good people throughout the state with providing academic study and instruction focused on global Jewish traditions, history, literature, art, and politics." Donors small and large have provided monetary gifts for, among other activities, course development and the future Israel Studies program.

The best way to make a donation is by writing directly to Dr. Goda. Based on his personal approach to communicating with donors, you will find that "If you make a gift to the center, you are part of the Center for Jewish Studies family." He would like to hear from the community about how the CJS programs are meeting needs and about how to get the next generation involved.

The CJS would not be what it is without the JCNCF community and the numerous programs that are partnerships between the JCNCF and the CJS. The CJS develops and delivers programs that are critical to the well-being, continuing education, and richness of the Jewish community, and the community supports CJS programs that include lectures, seminars, musical presentations, workshops, and the annual Gainesville Jewish Film Festival (the JFF), going into its tenth year. All faculty participate in the selection, presentation, and post-screening discussions that are a mainstay of the JFF, and the festival tends to be the most well-attended CJS/JCNCF program, with attendance at the curated dramas, comedies, and documentaries increasing every year. Another community-oriented adult education program that is being developed in collaboration with Oak Hammock is entitled "The State of Hatred 2020." In addition, senior citizens (over age 60) can apply to audit CJS classes. Everyone benefits from this symbiotic relationship with the Jewish community of Gainesville and throughout Florida.

The reach of the CJS is also worldwide. Students have traveled, studied, and conducted research abroad, some on scholarships based on need or interest. They have gone to France to study with faculty, have spent time in Israel to learn Hebrew, and have conducted research on topics ranging broadly from the Palestine Mandate, to various aspects of the Holocaust, to Jews in Medieval Spain. The CJS remains a supporting member of the Association for Jewish Studies, and several faculty attend the organization's conference annually to present papers and participate in roundtables.

Dr. Goda is proud of the way that the CJS maintains the interest of the community, and he appreciates hearing directly from community members about the programs they have attended and what might serve them as well or better. Sister Cities Program Looks to Continue Building Bridges

In 1997, the deputy mayor of Kfar Saba, Israel, came to Gainesville with the mayor of the neighboring Palestinian city of Qalqilya to seek the assistance of UF in obtaining a USAID grant to build a water treatment plant between their cities. At that time relations were relatively normal, with many Kfar Saba residents going to Qalqilya for shopping, dinner and car repairs, and many Qalqilya residents going to Kfar Saba for work.

Gainesville Mayor Bruce Delaney, who had just returned from a visit to our Russian sister city of Novorossiisk, proposed a three-way sister city relationship with Gainesville, Kfar Saba and Qalqilya. The mayor and deputy mayor said it might work if Gainesville were willing to invite both.

The following year, the Gainesville City Commission unanimously passed a resolution inviting Kfar Saba and Qalqilya to join Gainesville in the first trilateral US/Israeli/Palestinian sister city program. The resolution was hand delivered to the mayors of Kfar Saba and Qalqilya by Gainesville Mayor

Pegeen Hanrahan, who led a 10-member delegation including UF law professors to the region. The group was warmly received in both cities, and a sister city agreement was signed.

In July, 2000, a reciprocal delegation from Kfar Saba and Qalqilya travelled together to Gainesville to learn about our city, to meet with counterparts, and to bring a message of peace and reconciliation. They spoke at Rotary clubs, in schools; synagogues, churches, and mosques; at the City Commission meeting; and at various other civic events.

At the same time, Prime Minister Ehud Barak and Chairman Yasser Arafat were in Washington meeting with President Clinton to try to arrive at a final status agreement. Our Israeli and Palestinian delegations and supporters were hoping and praying for an agreement, so we could move forward with our comprehensive cultural and educational exchange program, and create a model for other U.S./Israeli and Palestinian cities to follow.

Unfortunately, no agreement was reached, and two months later, the second Intifada began, followed by the building of the Israeli security wall. Since then relations between Kfar Saba and Qalqilya have practically ended, although the sister city program has continued on a "dual-track" basis (Gainesville/Kfar Saba and Gainesville/Qalqilya").

Kfar Saba Mayor Rafi Saar has recently expressed a keen interest in reviving and expanding contacts between Gainesville and Kfar Saba counterparts to conduct mutually-beneficial exchanges and collaborative projects. Anyone interested in being involved is encouraged to contact me about participating in delegations and other exchanges and projects. The next trips are planned for November 1-10, 2019, and February 1-9, 2020.

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
Chavaya is Guided by Jewish Creativity
